

PURPOSE

On August 12, 2021 the Centre for Human Rights Research, in collaboration with the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation hosted <u>a virtual Q&A</u> for non-Indigenous people, or settlers, to learn more about the residential school system in Canada.

LIBRARY RESOURCES

BONES OF CROWS (2022)

Cree code talker Aline Spears survives her traumatic past in Canada's residential school system to continue her family's generational fight against systemic starvation, racism and sexual abuse. <u>Bones</u> <u>of Crows</u>



INDIAN HORSE (2017)

Saul Indian Horse, an Ojibway boy from Ontario, survives the residential school system and becomes a talented ice hockey player, only for his past traumas to resurface in his adulthood. <u>Indian Horse</u>



WHAT IT IS

Residential school denialism involves more than explicitly denying the residential system's existence. Denialists use several bad faith arguments that reject or misrepresent Indigenous people's experiences in residential schools. Joint Statement on Indian Residential School Denialism

> This joint statement affirms the reliability of using ground-penetrating radar in determining potential unmarked burial sites and denounces denialists' calls for "physical proof" (i.e., digging for remains).


